It may serve as a draft of the student's Ph.D. thesis proposal. The student's ability to critique research manuscripts and actively engage in research discussions will also be developed.

Participation: The student must give a weekly progress report (video conference or electronically) and participate actively in research discussions with her/his supervisor.

Critical Review of a Research Paper: The student will critically analyze a highly relevant and key research publication in her/his area of interest. Possible areas for thesis research by the student should also be identified.

Term Research Paper: The student shall write a research paper in an area related to her/his intended dissertation research. This paper should contain a comprehensive review of the





relevant academic literature, identification of research gaps, research questions to explore, and potential research methodologies. The paper should comprise the following sections: an Introduction, Literature Review (including a PRISMA report and literature coverage summary), Discussion of research gaps and research questions/hypotheses (including a suggested research model or conceptual framework), thoughts on potential Research Methodologies to answer those research questions/hypotheses, Conclusion, and Reference List.

REQUIRED TEXTBOOK

There is no required textbook. All existing material which is relevant to the topic of interest selected by the student and approved by the instructor will serve as reference material for the course.


